EDINBURGH LOOKS IN A MIRROR

Poetry became reality for Edinburgh Seventh-day Adventist church on Saturday (Sabbath), 3 August 2013 when a 'mystery worshipper', 'Soul Searcher' joined the congregation for morning worship.

The Scottish National poet, Robert Burns writes,

"O would some power the giftie gie us, to see ourselves as others see us."

Having now seen themselves in 'Soul Searcher's' mirror – an online blog – Edinburgh members are now looking at what lessons they can learn from their anonymous friend.

The blog, written in a slightly humorous and often sharp edged style, noted that *"Bearing in mind everything I've read online about the cult-like characteristics of the SDA church, much of it written by disgruntled former members, I have to say that their website looks straightforwardly Christian enough, and that there was nothing about today's service that seemed deviant or sinister."*

Her main challenge with the service was that it was rather long, (understandable being a baptism), and she got a bit lost with some of the 20 hymns sung during the morning.

On the positive side she was impressed by the commitment of the two boys who got baptised, and was equally impressed by the one of them who *"also sang a solo in a rather lovely baritone voice that he was clearly only just getting used to, and not a hint of nerves."*



'Soul Searcher' describes herself as a 'Post-Christian Monotheist' but notes, *"It's probably easiest to tell people that I'm 'no longer a Christian', but that isn't the end of the story. How can I decide for sure until I've fully explored the options?"* Thus her multiple visits to the churches of Edinburgh.

Will she come back to the Adventist church? Perhaps not, but who can tell. What is clear is that every congregation needs to expect and welcome the unannounced visitor. As Pastor Jimmy Botha put it with a wry smile on his face, *"If I knew she was coming, I'd have preached better!"*

That is also the message in the Local Church Communication Audit, a simple document that the BUC Communication Department has been sharing with churches across the whole of the British Isles. This simple document helps churches to see (Cont'd. p. 4)

SAFE IN HIS GRACE

"The harvest is past, the summer is ended, and we are not saved" (Jeremiah 8:20.)

Without Christ I am lost: *"There is none righteous, no, not one. They are all gone out of the way" (Romans 3:10-12.)*

But in Christ the assurance is given: *"If thou shalt confess with thy mouth the Lord Jesus, and shalt believe in thine heart that God hath raised him from the dead, thou shalt be saved" (Romans 10:9.)*

Jesus' right-standing with His Father is all I will ever need: declared mine as I receive it at the foot of the Cross, it remains mine as I allow His Spirit to engrave it on my heart. I take hold of this unique virtue through a faith that is itself a gift from above. So then, what is my work?



"This is the work of God, that ye believe on him whom he hath sent". (John 6:29) The Adversary must hold his sides in sardonic mirth when he sees one of God's remnant people claiming to keep the Law of God, yet refusing to embrace the only way to make that possible; by trusting the One the Father sent.

Only through faith can I ever hope to keep God's Law, for it is only in full surrender to Christ's Spirit that I allow Him to have His way in me. Christ's prayer in Gethsemane must become my prayer, or I will not be saved: Luke 22:42 *"Not my will, but thine, be done"*. This is surrender in love.

"Who shall deliver me from the body of this death? I thank God through Jesus Christ our Lord". (Romans 7:24, 25)

At the cross awaits a miracle encased in a

promise: Romans 8:1 *"There is now no condemnation to them which are in Christ Jesus, who walk not after the flesh, but after the Spirit"*.

No condemnation? The Judgement holds no dread? Not if I am in Christ. But what does "in Christ" mean? It means to live in obedience to God's Spirit, not in obeisance to my fallen nature.

Am I walking in the Spirit? Then I am not condemned. Am I righteous? Only as long as I submit to Him. When I go my own way I fall back into my dark pit: Proverbs 26:11 *"As a dog returns to his vomit, so a fool returns to his folly"*. Hebrews 10:39 *"But we are not of them who draw back unto perdition; but of them that believe to the saving of the soul"*.

It is written, *"This is his name whereby he shall be called, The Lord Our Righteousness" (Jeremiah 23:6.)*

Perfection? Here it is; the only righteousness I shall ever need.

I am to buy *"white raiment, that thou mayest be clothed, and that the shame of thy nakedness do not appear" (Revelation 3:18.)* Yet the only currency I own is my great need!

Will I risk my own soul? Ezekiel 14:14 *"Noah, Daniel, and Job ... should deliver but their own souls ..."* Did these have access to a different uprightness? No, the same - Christ's.

The entire Old Testament sacrificial system speaks only of Christ: Hebrews 9:22 *"Without shedding of blood is no remission"*. As the Israelites were not to look to the blood of goats and calves, so I am not to look to my own sacrifices but, *"unto Jesus the author and finisher of our faith" (Hebrews 12:2.)*

I really enjoy gardens, particularly the sense of peace I feel in a well-designed and maintained one. In July I went for a walk around the Oxford Arboretum with my wife, our daughter - Beth, her husband - Tim, and our one-year-old granddaughter – Zara. We inhaled the changing aromas as we walked from flowery glades through elegant evergreens, down into the mossy woods, and out into a freshly-mown meadow. Our steps were slow, paced to match the tiny feet and the exploring wonder of a toddler.

The garden was delightful, but the tall trees and unusual species were not the focus of my attention. This walk was deliberately chosen because Beth's second baby was overdue. In four hours she would drive to the hospital to have her labour induced. This would be the last walk with only one grandchild, and we made the most of our time together. We played hide and seek with Zara. We crept slowly up to a gloriously-coloured peacock that did not seem at all frightened of us. We experienced a taste of heaven together in the calm and shaded beauty of the garden.



When God wanted the perfect environment to develop a relationship with Adam and Eve, He placed them in a newly created garden where they could choose what to do. (Genesis 1-3) Many years later, Jesus went to the Garden of Gethsemane, the place of suffering, when He needed to spend time wrestling in passionate and intimate conversation with His Father. (Matthew 26:39)

Today, the agricultural metaphors (e.g. John 15:5ff) that Jesus used still apply to our relationship with Him. As the church, we are like a garden for grapevines, a vineyard. Just as well-grafted branches produce grapes, so we will

grow the fruit of the Spirit as we are interconnected with Jesus and draw all our strength from Him. (John 15:8) This is the garden of fruitfulness. As we share our food with the needy after a harvest festival, we are enacting the effect of Christ in our lives. We receive grace and blessings from Him so that we can pass them on to others.

When Jesus returns and recreates a new world, He will save those who are connected to Him. They will be producing delicious fruits. Right in the centre of the New Jerusalem the tree of life grows from the river of life that springs from the throne of God and Jesus. (Rev

22:1) God Himself will walk with us in this new garden, and peace shall reign at last.

The time I spent in that garden with my precious family at that critical moment before the birth of our grandson Leo will always be a special memory. Christ invites us to journey with Him through the different gardens of life. We also have to visit the gardens of choice, suffering and fruitfulness in preparation for the garden of celebration in heaven. I know we will gain extra strength for the journey when we experience His presence, right beside us, as we walk through these gardens of our lives.

There is no more pressing question. We are counselled never to say "I am saved," yet we are to know when we have a saving relationship with the Father through the Son. But how will I know?

Ellen White writes (Steps to Christ, Chapter 7 - THE TEST OF DISCIPLESHIP), "*Who has the heart? With whom are our thoughts? Of whom do we love to converse? Who has our warmest affections and our best energies? If we are Christ's, our thoughts are with Him, and our sweetest thoughts are of Him. All we have and are is consecrated to Him. We long to bear His image, breathe His spirit, do His will, and please Him in all things.*"

Is this true in my life? If not, then "*Seek ye the Lord while he may be found*" (Isaiah 55:6.)

I often pluck out scriptural promises while ignoring sound rebuke.



Jeremiah 8:5-7 "*Why then is this people ... slid- den back by a perpetual backsliding? ... the stork in the heaven knoweth her appointed times ... but my people know not the judgment of the Lord*".

Jeremiah 8:22 asks, "*Is there no balm in Gile- ad; is there no physician there?*" The Physician is here for He promised, "*I am with you al- ways*" (Matthew 28:20.)

I can never deserve the promise. I can only come in humility of soul, empty-handed, open- hearted.

Full provision has been made for me and I sing, "*All to Jesus I surrender*". through the worship time of the main service. It was nice to be noticed and cared for...something many churches can improve on...including our own."

Grace had Michelle dedicated by Pastor Victor Harewood with a friend (who is presently at Newbold College) as her representative. Sadly Grace decided to return to Nigeria as her husband was not granted a visa to come to the UK.

At Aberdeen airport to make the returning journey home, Grace was surprised when she was met by three youths from the Aberdeen Church. They were on their way to the recent TED Youth Congress and all boarded the same outgoing flight changing at Frankfurt. One of the party relayed Grace's experience to the Aberdeen congregation on her request when they returned. It told of how Grace had prayed and God blessed her during this time of difficulty. Firstly, the youths witnessed how

Grace was allowed to take her excess luggage on board the plane without paying a penny. This was God's first blessing. She was returning with 125Kg, much more than each person is allowed. Her baggage included 3 lots of hand luggage plus baby Michelle. .

For the change over in Frankfurt, the good Christian young people decided to help Grace with her luggage and escort her to the next gate. With the expanse of the airport their walk took about 20 minutes. However, to their surprise when they arrived at the gate the youths realised that their flight to take them to the congress was departing from the gate next to where Grace's was leaving to go to Nigeria. God's second blessing.

Finally, Grace's third blessing came in the form of a gift of £900 from the university. They were impressed with how Grace had completed her studies despite being heavily pregnant and managing without her husband. May God grant Grace more graces as she resumes her life in Nigeria with her new family and qualification.

“Appy Sabbath!”

It trips off the tongue so easily, “Happy Sabbath!” But it could now take on more meaning if we employ new technology.

Pastors and church leaders often express concern about Sabbath School attendance and contributions, and parents sometimes despair at retaining their children’s focus on things spiritual, but help is now at hand. A wide range of internet apps (applications) are available free - or for a few pence – to download to our personal smart phones. With all we need literally at our fingertips 24/7, no longer can we claim insufficient time for study or church catch up.

In addition to live broadcasts, on the established church websites, such as 3ABN, Amazing Facts, Central Study Hour, Sabbath School U and the SEC Media live streamed UK church services, you can now access earthly spiritual support from icons on your mobile phone. (see opposite)

The Sabbath School 3 app delivers all the study guides and highlighted texts are immediately accessed. Invited comments can be typed in and stored for subsequent Sabbath School discussion. Add to this the Ellen White (EGW) app, with all her writings, and you have a powerful tool to

aid “the hope that is within you” in your outreach activities.

In this year of Revival and Reformation, the in prayer app offers a daily devotional and automatic reminder to join the worldwide church in prayer, daily, at 7am and 7pm. The map reveals those locally who are joining you!

So, if you are away, looking for the nearest Adventist Church, forgot your Advent Hymnal, have a short break to prepare for Sabbath School, or want to watch a spiritually uplifting sermon, get ‘appy and have a spiritually enriching “Happy Sabbath”!

My Name is Maris Spalins. I was born in 1992 in Tashkent, Uzbekistan. My brother and I were born into a Seventh-day Adventist family. My mum and dad were members of the SDA Church. My dad left us when we were young and my mum brought us up. She worked very hard to provide for me and my brother and she also left the Church.

Whilst I was at school I was very active and liked sports. My friends considered me very good at them. I was trying to excel in football and was working very hard to become a professional footballer.

I successfully graduated from high school and continued my studies at the College studying Finances. I continued training, but looking back I realize that God had other plans for me but at the time I didn't want to hear about anything but professional football.

We had to leave Tashkent and moved to Scotland. I continued my training and started learning English. I was even invited to London to take part in football trials where coaches selected me to play in a professional team. I wanted to become a footballer so much that it took over my life; before I knew it I was on the path of Satan as all I wanted was fame and money.

God didn't allow me to ruin myself with greed and pride. God showed me the way. One day during a game I fell on the ground and lost consciousness. When I came round I saw nurses around me. I couldn't remember what happened

to me. It was a miracle that my trauma wasn't serious and I survived.

I still wanted to pursue my career in football but also prayed to God. I wanted to praise the God with my game. I had constant fight within me; I was thinking 'what will happen after I achieve all the fame and money. What else?' I realized that it doesn't mean a thing. The same night I decided to decline the offer I was waiting for so long. I decided to dedicate myself to God and ministry to people.

I was aware of God since my childhood as my Mother taught me a lot about God and told me to seek God's advice in life. I was praying and began seeking answers to my questions in the Bible. Suddenly I felt like God started opening my eyes and everything began makes sense for me. On the 17th of December 2011 I was baptised and became a member of our church in Glasgow.

Every Friday I was taking part in Youth Prayer and Bible Studies. Every Wednesday I was meeting my friends for prayer in the church where we would pray for the needs of our neighbours. I also was very active in various missionary projects, distributing Christian books and I was telling people about the Christ. Also I was taking part in Sabbath ministry in Glasgow Church.

On the 11th of August 2012 my mother and my brother Albert were also baptised. I thank God for that. I am grateful to God for showing me and my family the right way. I feel like a new man with new goals and values. I have the greatest desire to worship God and to teach others about His way. I want to teach people about Jesus' Christ sacrifice for each one of us, about his power to change our hearts. I want to preach God's word around the earth and the good news of hope to the penitent human.

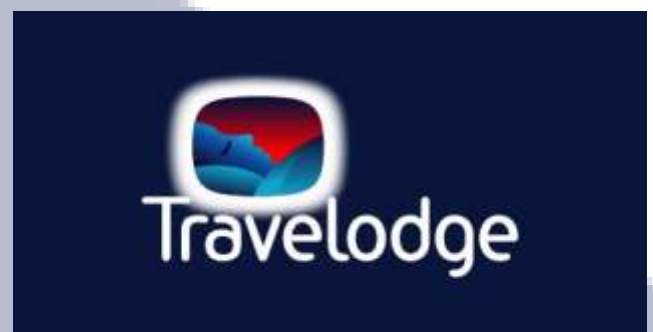
